Climate communication




Yale's Climate Change Communication group, in collaboration with Potential Energy, tested three key messages with 57,968 participants across 23 countries. They found.

- The "urgency & generational" message emphasized climate change and extreme weather as an urgent threat ("here and now").
- The "polluter accountability" message emphasized climate change as a responsibility and fairness issue.
- The "climate progress" message primarily emphasized climate change solutions. We found all three messages had positive effects on support for climate action.

"Re.Climate's 2024 National Media Analysis report found that Canada's national media are covering climate change more.

However, they are failing to connect the dots between what is causing climate change and the solutions. That's a problem when traditional media can shape public opinion and influence decision makers."

Climate reports			
The Energy Mix and The Canadian Climate Institute	Ottawa shifts its Net-Zero Grid deadline from 2025 to 2050. The final version of Canada's Clean Electricity Regulations (CER) will postpone the deadline to fully decarbonize the country's electricity grids from 2035 to 2050 and scale back the power sector's emission reductions by mid-century from 342 to 181 million tonnes.

The Energy Mix	Ottawa's oil and gas pollution cap regulations, still in draft form, won't take effect until 2030. Janetta McKenzie from the Calgary-based Pembina Institute said in a release, while "other economic sectors, and everyday Canadians, have taken steps to educe their emissions in recent years, emissions from oil and gas production have continued to grow." Canadian Climate Institute	From President Rick Smith's blog: Climate wrapped: top 10 good news stories on climate and clean energy in 2024.
	 EV sales in Canada continued to rise. Globally it was the same storey EV's rising. IEA projects that global demand for fossil fuels will peak before 2030. Clean electricity investments continued to soar. Some provinces and territories made progress on clean energy. The cost of clean energy continued to drop, supporting affordability. Indigenous nations led on clean energy. Canada's emissions drop – 8% below where they were in 2005. Quebec committed to 100% renewable energy to heat all buildings and Vancouver avoided a reversal of its nation-leading rules that banned gas heating for most buildings. B.C. and Alberta have already cut half of their methane emissions from the oil and gas sector.



2024 set new records for extreme heat around the world in what is already the warmest decade on record. According to the World Meteorological Organization sea-level rise and ocean heating are accelerating along with the loss of ice from glaciers. The biggest news for climate is the re-election of Trump; the GOP will undoubtedly target regulations and laws passed during the Biden administration. On the other hand, constituencies for clean energy are stronger and broader than the last time Trump came into office.



- Help groups plan and organize events


